



# Bennett Bean

THE MATERIAL BOUNDARIES THAT SEPARATE A PAINTING, a sculpture, and a ceramic vessel seem irrelevant to Bennett Bean, whose pieces—nonfunctional vessels and sculptural objects distinguished by a fluid, asymmetrically rhythmic flow of color, line, and plane—pass with breathtaking ease between categories. In Bean's work, geometric abstraction meets biomorphism in a process that—like the confluence of two streams into a single current—amplifies a sense of energy while urging competing elements toward a single, expressive purpose.

Bean, who lives and works in New Jersey, uses a variety of post-firing techniques to embellish his pieces. With stencils, glazes, and acrylic paints, he composes vibrant abstract designs on their surfaces. His vessels have a mesmerizing radiance thanks to the application of gold leaf to their undulating interiors. With an impeccable sense of control, Bean flirts with the potential for visual inebriation, but he holds this tendency in check through the use of exposed, smoky-white earthenware surfaces, which have a rustically calming influence on his vessels.

Bean's work is in the permanent collections of museums around the United States, including the Boston Museum of Fine Arts in Massachusetts and the Smithsonian American Art Museum in Washington, D.C.
